WHAT IS THE IASC?

Established in June 1992 in response to GA resolution 46/182 and reaffirmed by subsequent GA resolutions.

Primary global coordination mechanism for inter-agency coordination on humanitarian issues.

Only formal UN coordination mechanism that includes non-UN entities.

Led by the Emergency Relief Coordinator to facilitate the leadership role of the UN Secretary-General.



OBJECTIVES OF THE IASC

Strategic decisions on operational issues

Facilitate an effective, coordinated, collective humanitarian response to crises.

Policy development

System-wide policies and humanitarian guidelines for humanitarian operations.

Advocacy

Platform for the humanitarian community to advocate collectively for common principles and issues.

Dialogue


Forum for dialogue among humanitarian actors and deliberation on key issues of impact on humanitarian action.

WHY THE REFORM

- Going back to basics (46/182) Recognizing that the IASC is, by definition, the Committee of the Principals.
- New Strategic Priorities
- Addressing previous issues that posed challenges in the efficient functioning of the structures
- Focusing on results and concrete deliverables need to demonstrate relevance and effectiveness
- Collaboration Structures to work well together (complementing each others' roles).
- Inclusivity Need to systematically engage and capitalize on the wealth of knowledge and expertise from non-IASC entities
- Management Guidance and support, monitoring, follow-up, accountability, communication/partnerships (strengthened IASC secretariat).



WAY FORWARD

- Committee meeting on 29 May (horizon scanning/ EWEA report, sustain/severe, PSEA/SHA, Disabilities, UNDS/Migration/Refugees, GHO) and 5 December
- **EDG** working on supporting ongoing operations (*Mozambique, Ebola, Libya, Yemen, Syria, etc.*) + various field visits.
 - P2P (Afghanistan, Mozambique upcoming OPR DRC)
- Focus on erecting OPAG and RGs:
 - First OPAG meeting a success
 - RGs working on finalizing list of concrete deliverables until end 2019 (Principals decisions, IASC workplan, EDG priorities)
 - Firming up relations with EDG and entities associated with the IASC
 - Inclusivity of work
 - 2nd Face to Face meeting first week of November
- Light review of structures in March 2020 to determine effectiveness and suitability.



HIGHLIGHTS OF KEY ACHIEVEMENTS


- Coordination of humanitarian action in response to various crises (including recently to Mozambique, Venezuela, Yemen, Syria, DRC/Ebola)
- Humanitarian Reform (2005): ERC, clusters, etc.
- Transformative Agenda (2011): leadership, coordination, accountability
- L3 Review: **Scale-Up Protocols** (completed) and Severe/Sustain designation (near completion).
- Field Support (STAIT/ P2P, MHPSS, etc.)
- Development of guidelines, policies, tools.
- Early Warning Early Action Analysis (bi-Annual)
