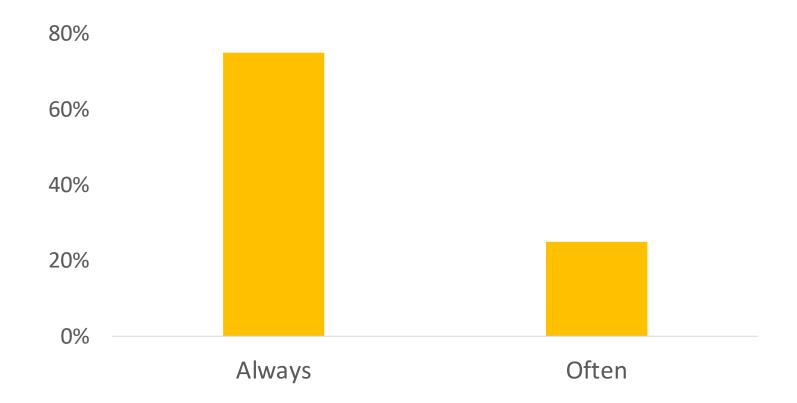


Are you satisfied with the frequency of cluster meetings?

Did the staff who represented your organization at cluster meetings have decision-making authority and were they able to follow-up on decisions made?

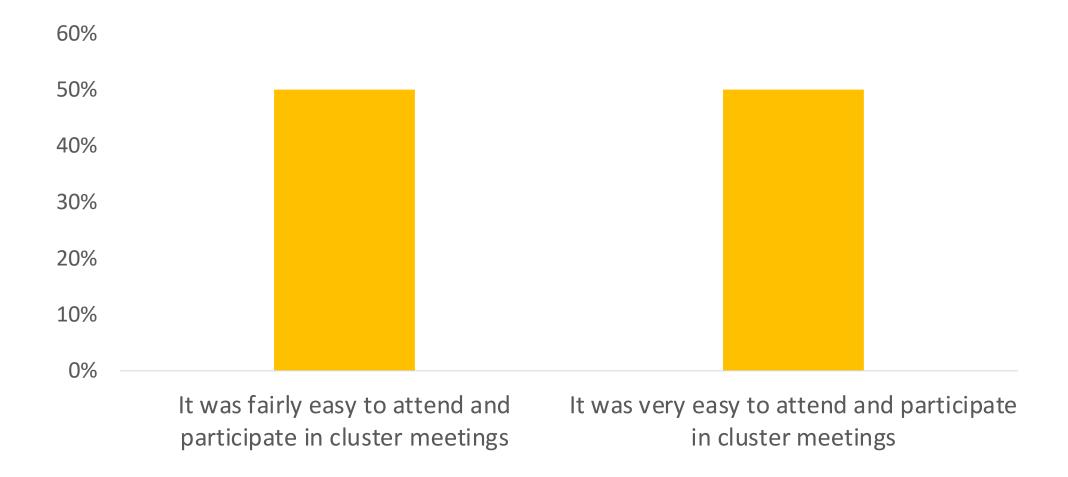

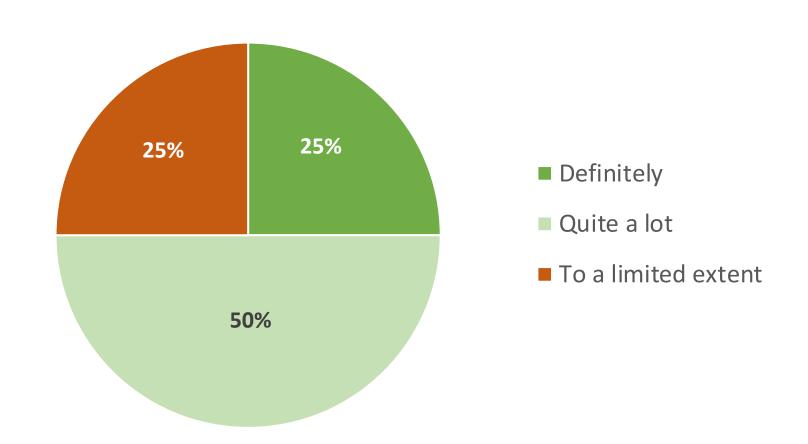

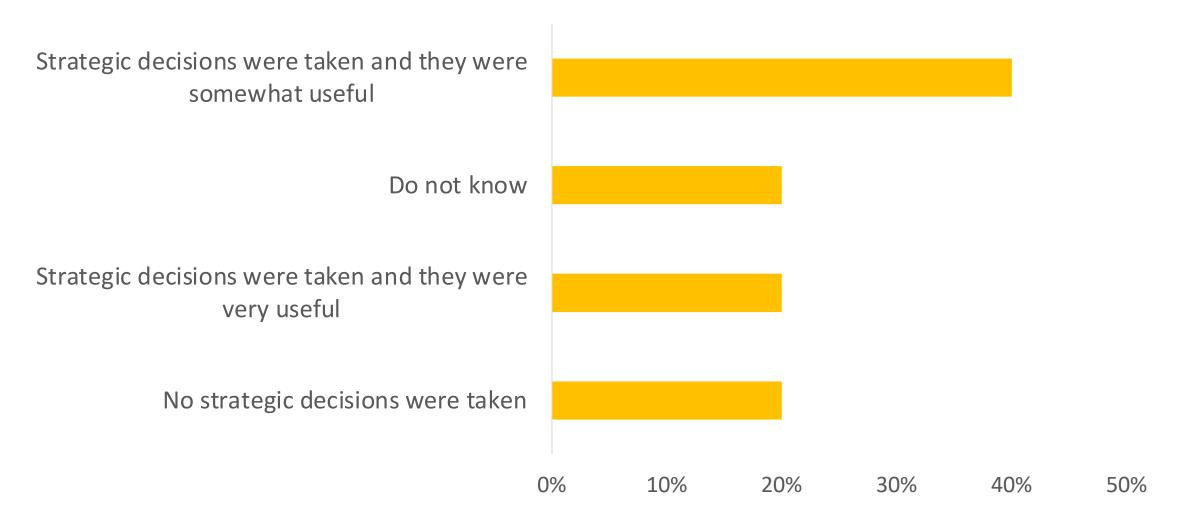

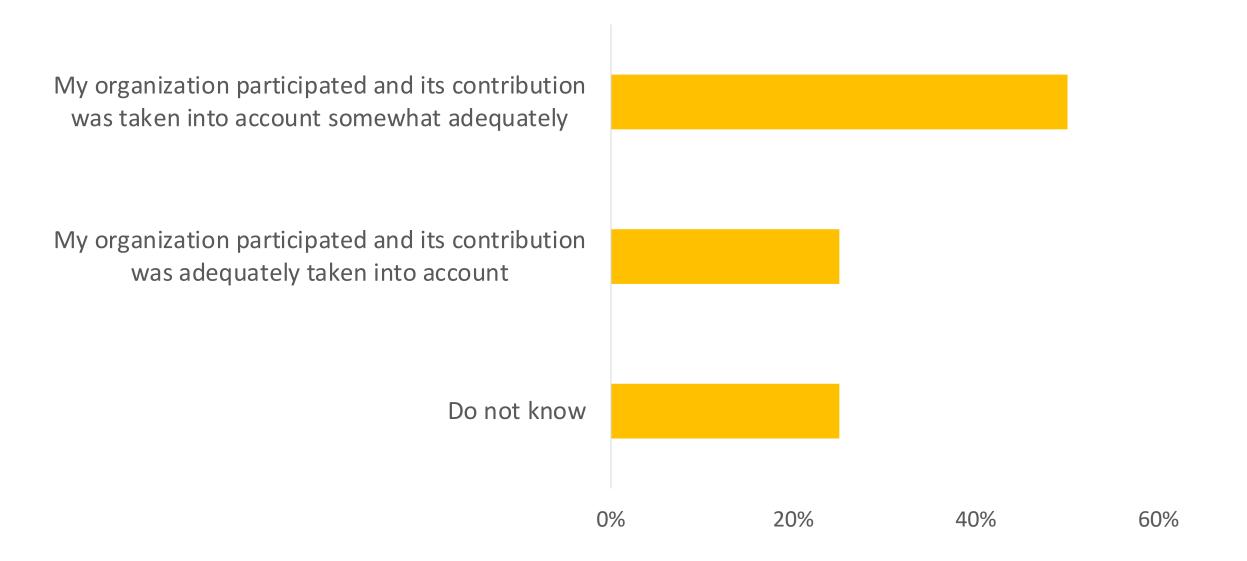

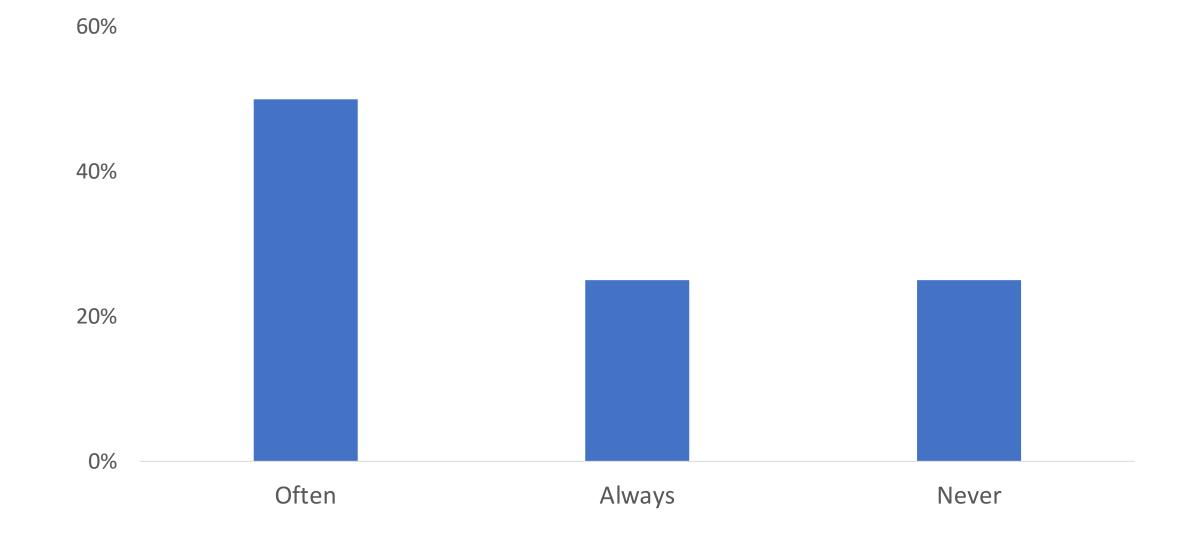

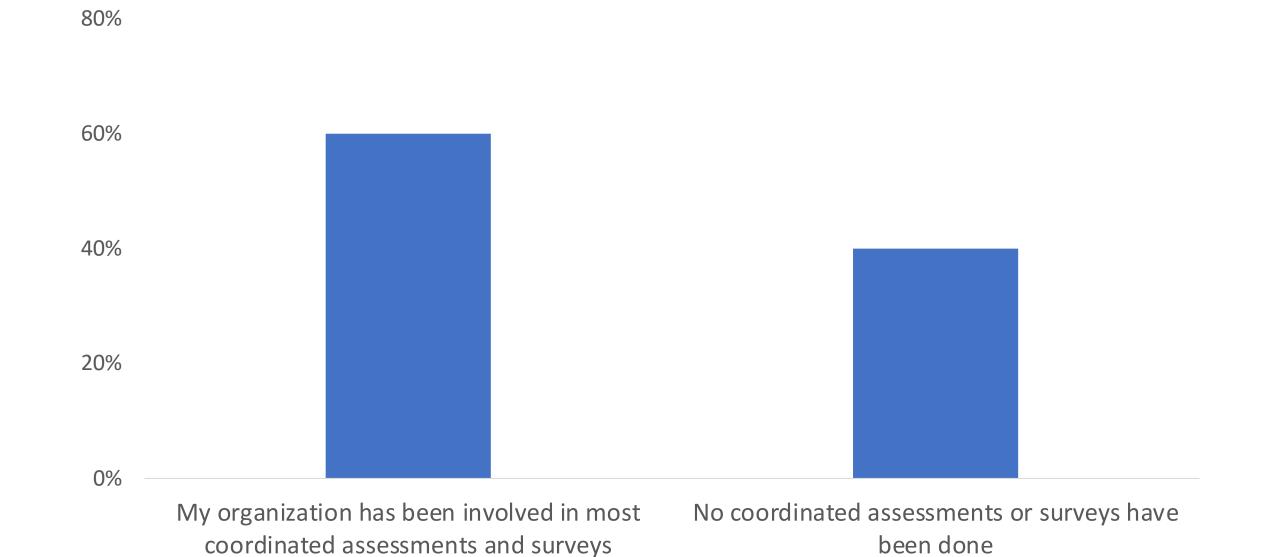
- As lead organization, mapping of all member organization has been a key aspect

 It is rarely clear what the cluster is accomplishing



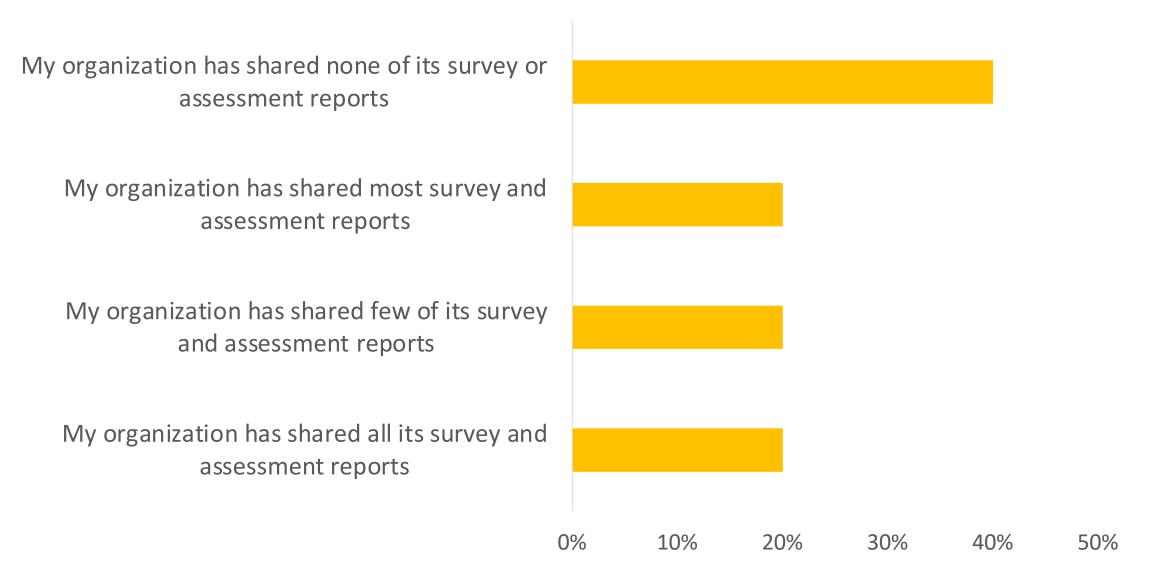

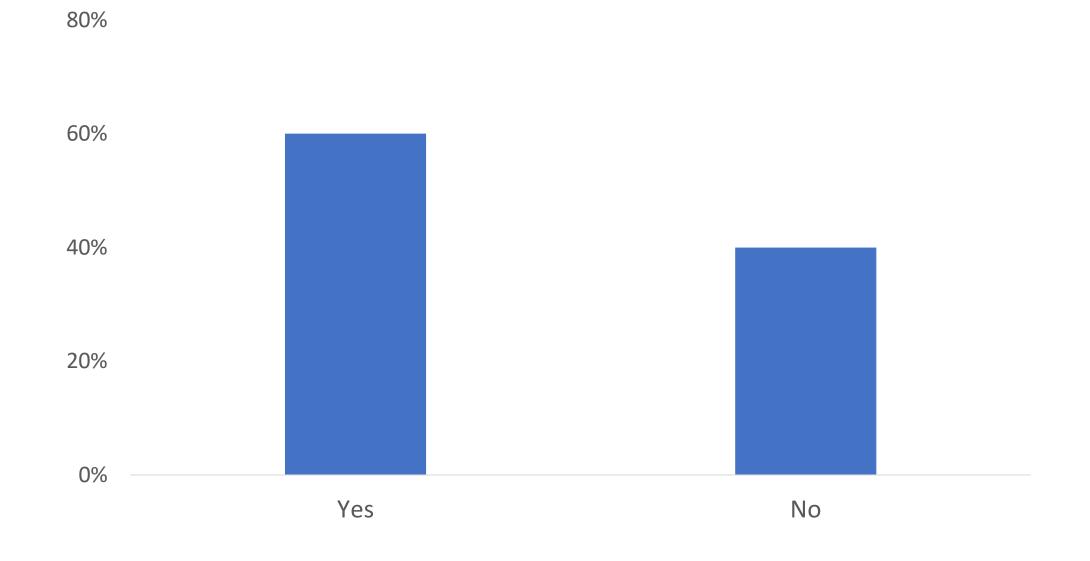

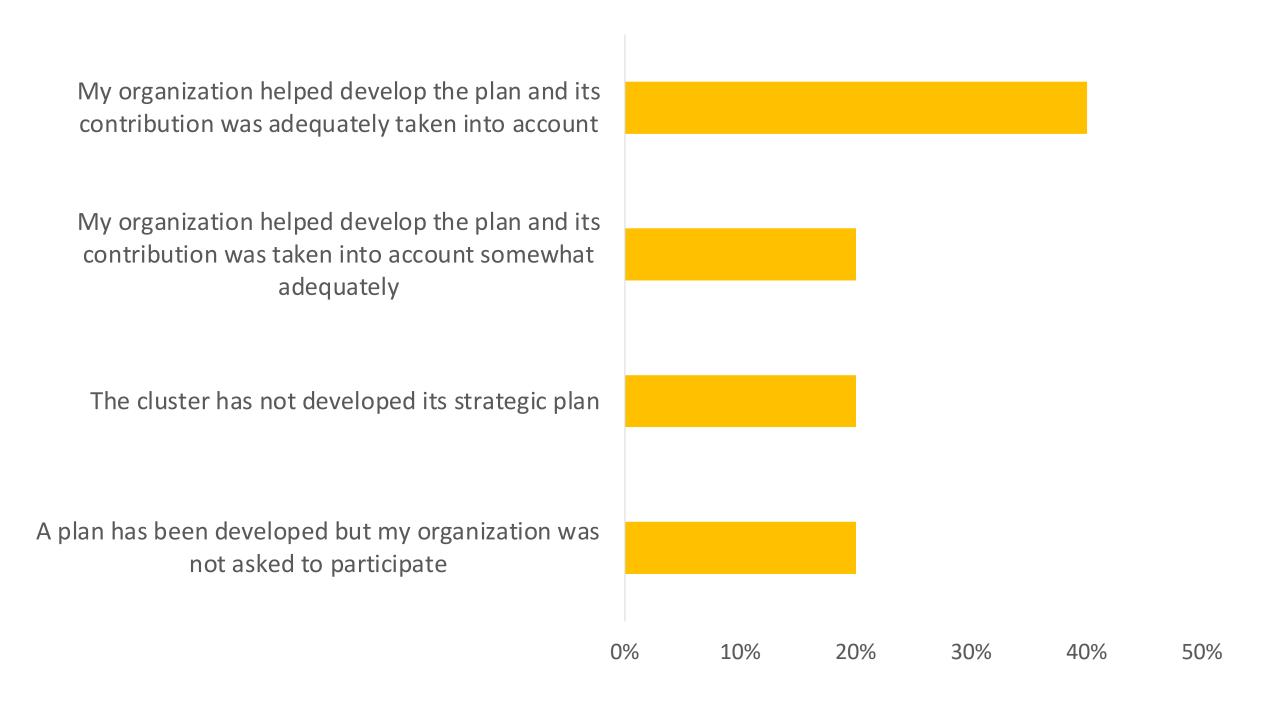

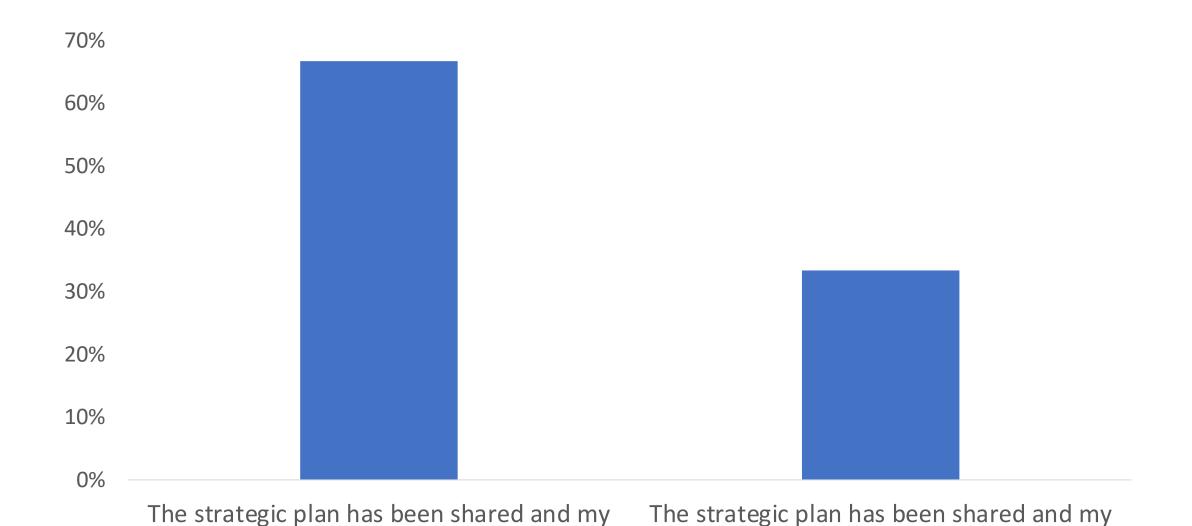

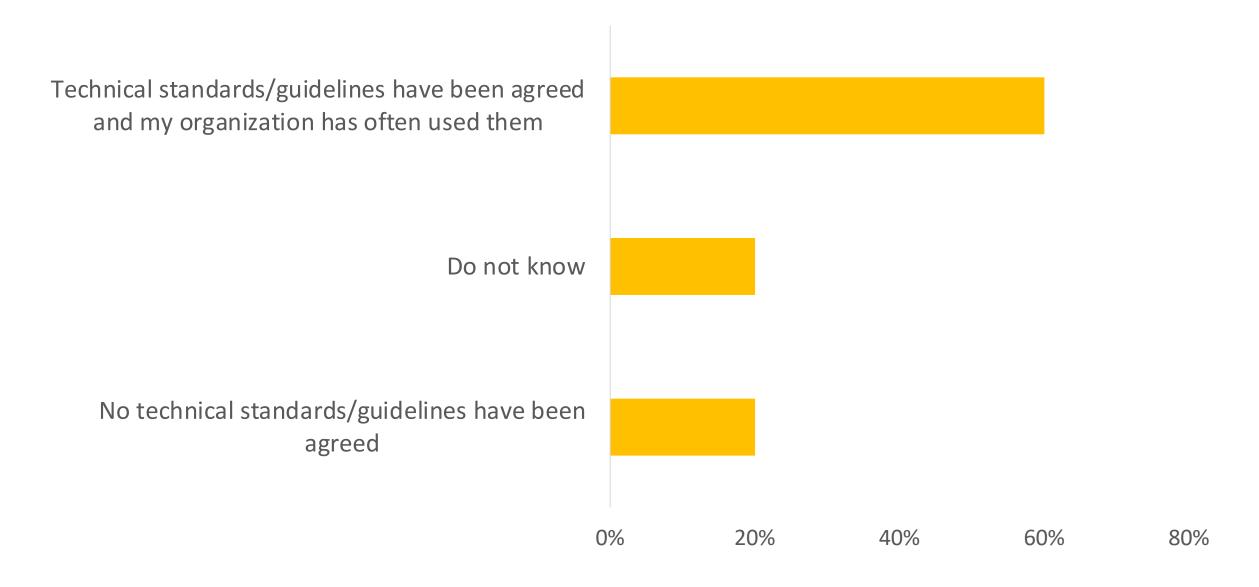


Has the cluster strategic plan guided the response of your organization in the last 6 months?

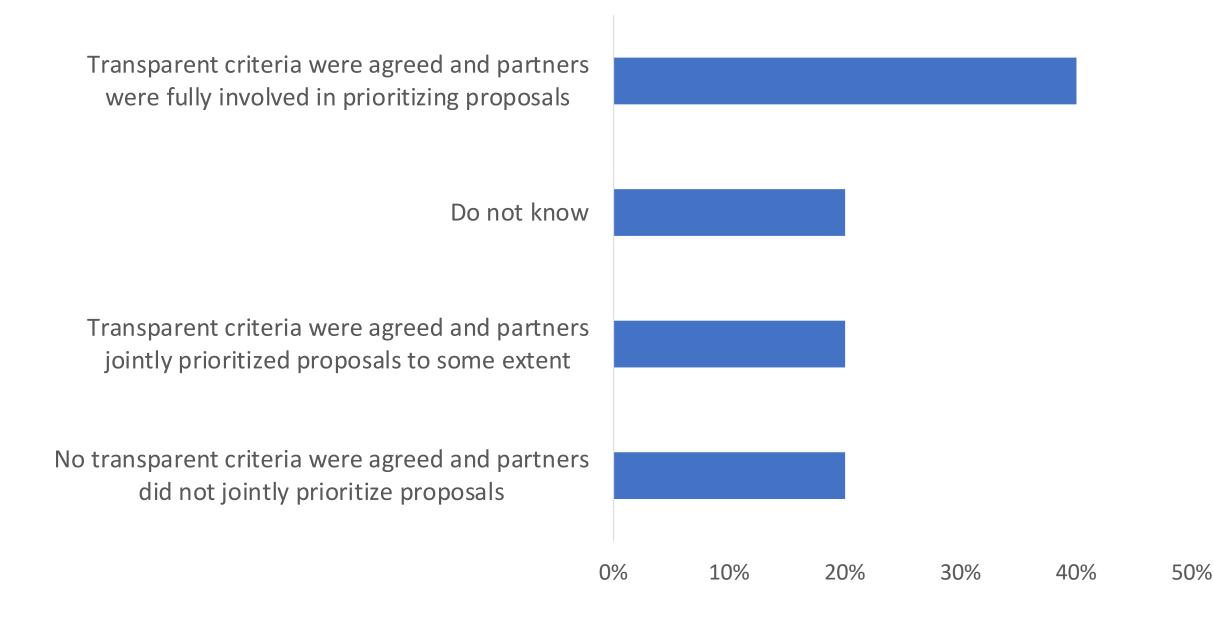

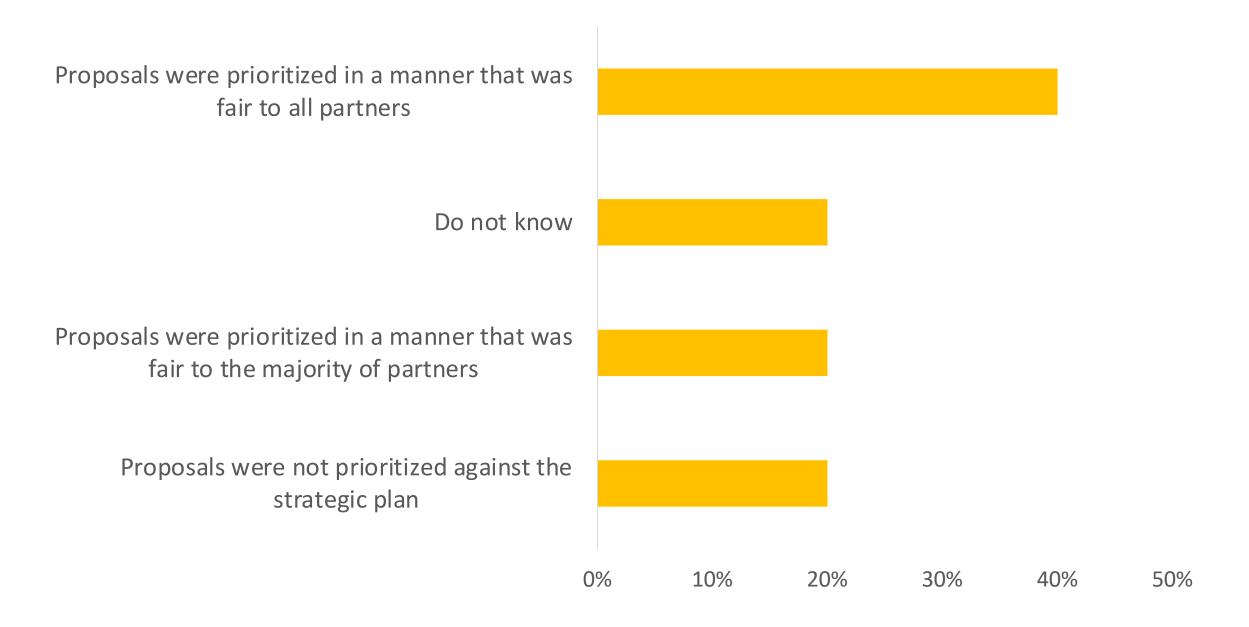


Have cluster partners participated in prioritizing proposals under the strategic plan. Were transparent criteria agreed?

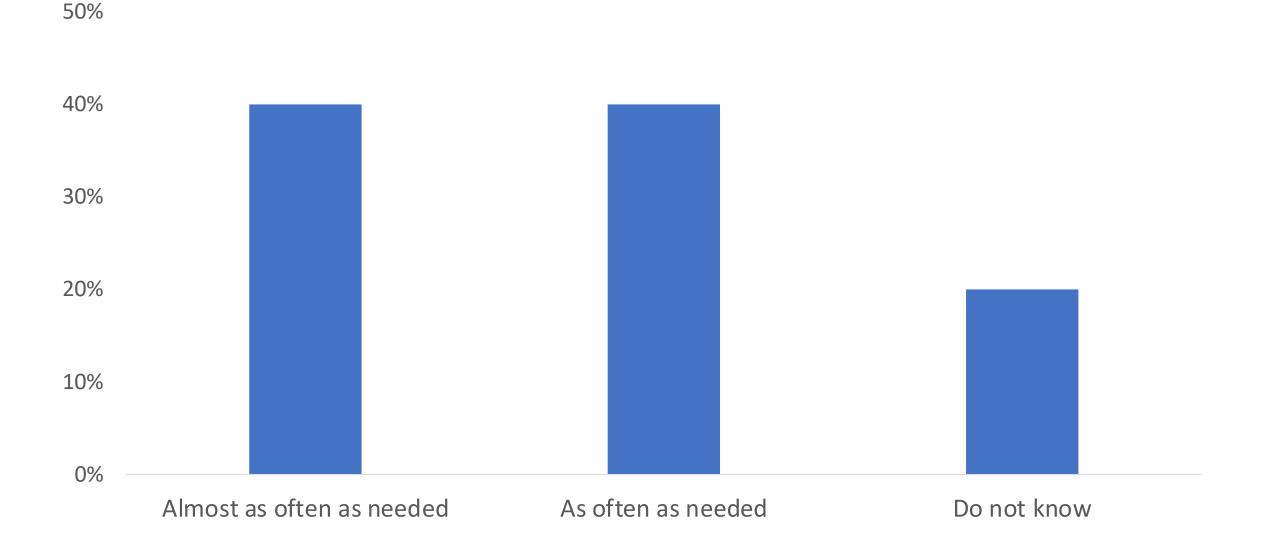




Were proposals prioritized against the strategic plan in a manner that was fair to all partners?

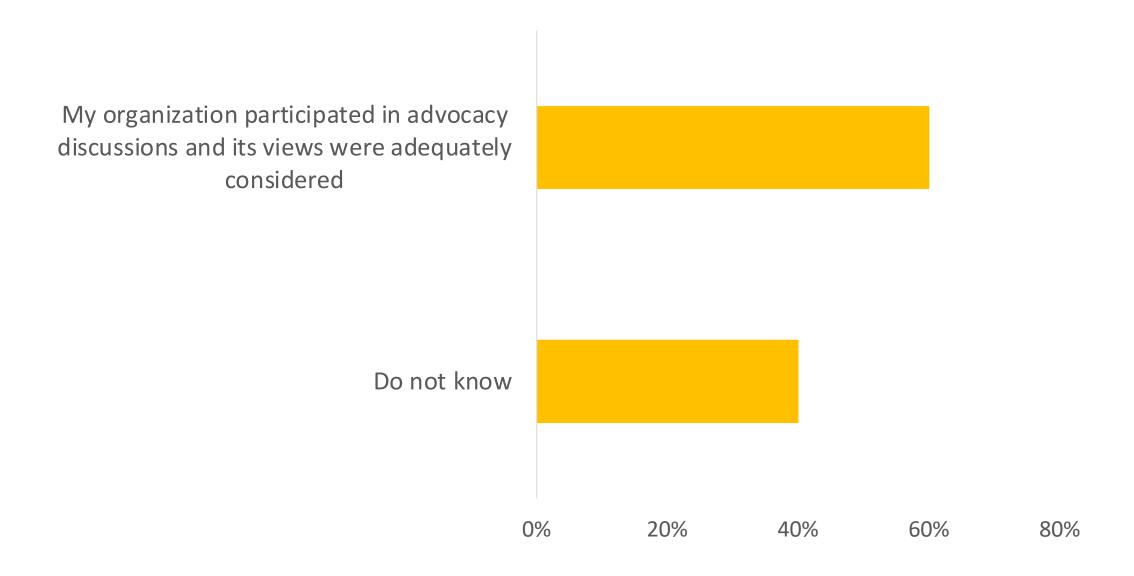


How often has the cluster coordinator reported on the cluster's funding status against needs?

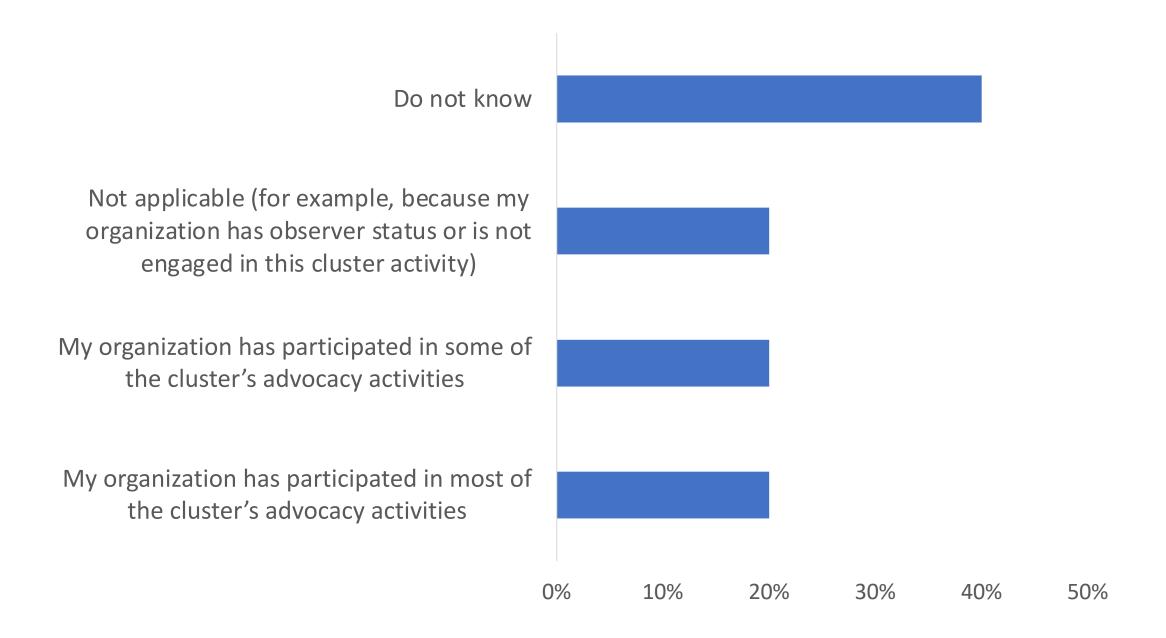




Have issues requiring advocacy been identified and discussed together with your organization?

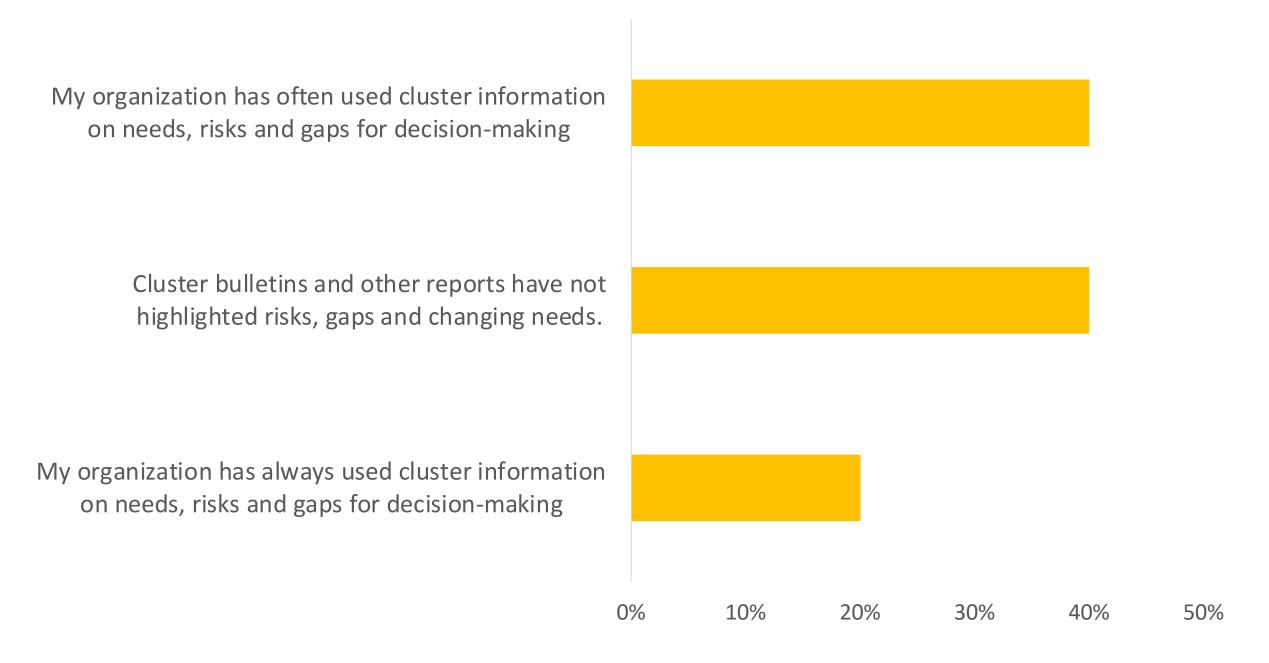


Has your organization participated in cluster advocacy activities?





Have cluster bulletins or updates highlighted risks, gaps and changing needs, and has this information influenced your organization's decisions?

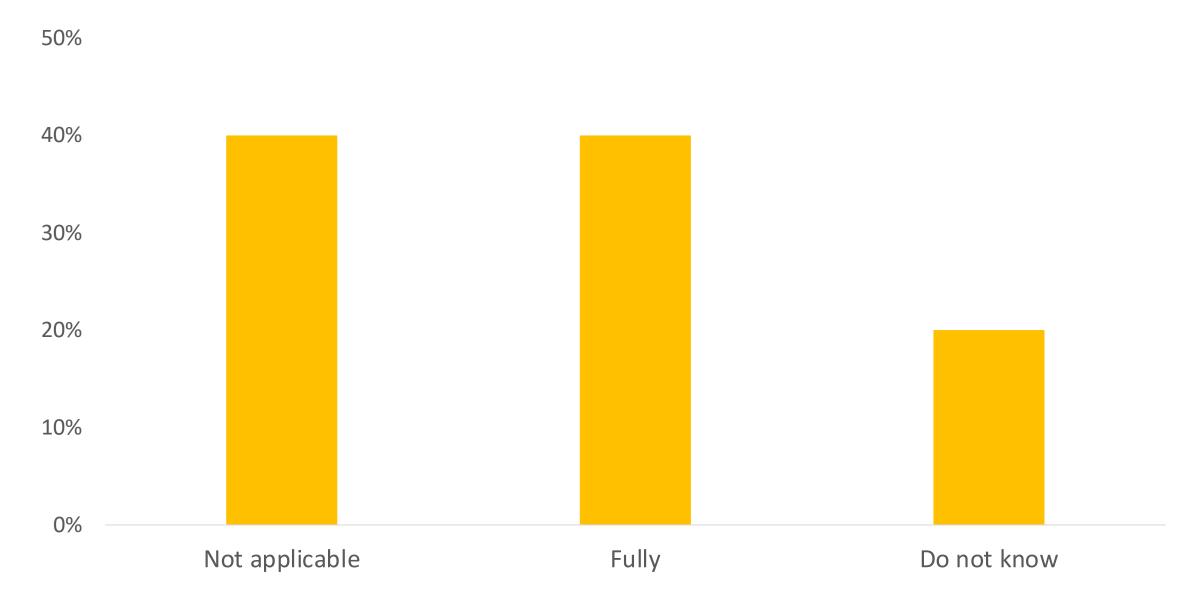

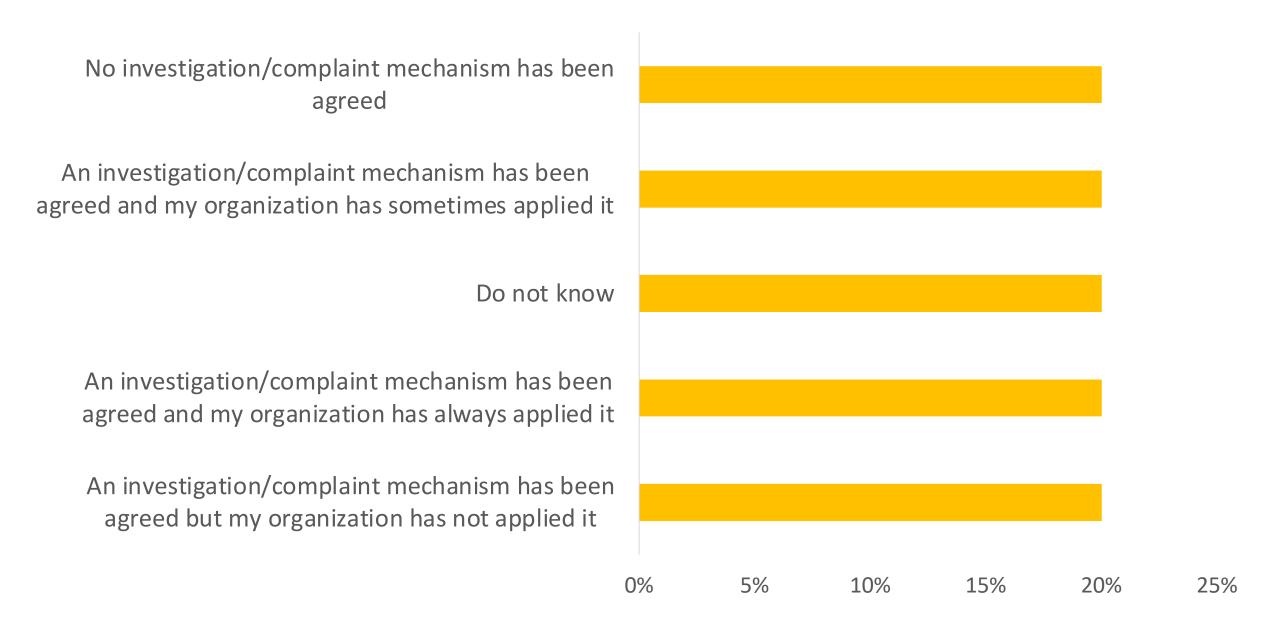

Some provincial clusters are being quite useless in terms of distribution of key information at national level. To know what's happening, be part of HRP operation, or attend some call for proposals, it is necessary to be part of national cluster in Maputo. At the moment it is almost only It is just a platform used to ask for needs, like a client of one supermarket. That is not in my opinion the main spirit of one cluster. Resuming, I think that some provincial clusters are not working as it should do, and the only valuable and useful platform is the national platform.

Our organization does not work in Cabo Delgado, which seems to be the only place where the Cluster operates

Standards and bulletins may have been made, but we have never seen them

Cluster lead, the organization has always advocated for members to cooperate and work together to better serve the people in need

I think the Cluster could do a better job of highlighting/sharing (*with concrete details*) what it is doing. Also, it would be interesting to understand what the cluster does outside of Cabo Delgado (i.e. in other provinces) since not all organizations work there. It seems that each meeting should have a clear feedback stream instead of long, repetitive discussions that don't seem to have solutions. Action items should always be actionable for everyone if the Cluster is to be an inclusive body. For example, when the meeting hosts speak using only acronyms and calls on people without identifying who they are, it is unclear what is happening (especially for Portuguese speakers in the group). Small adjustments could make a big difference.
